For example, we are late for the pressure washer party, but now that we have been belted to the bar, we are having a wonderful time... water. Buying a pressure washer last year has made our lives much easier, in many ways and so many places. But, of course, our initiation into the joys of pressure washers started with a problem: we had some outdoor carpets that were turning green from algae growth, and none of our conventional cleaning methods would eliminate discoloration, especially in bindings. We tried to use a high-powered nozzle in a normal garden hose, tried several spray cleaners and commercial stain removers, and even brought our faithful carpet steam out there, all in vain. Some of our friends suggested we try to use your pressure washer, and voila: stains removed, outdoor carpets saved! We immediately started looking for our own pressure washer (also known as power washer), shopping at major home improvement stores, hardware stores and garden centers. We found that there are countless models to choose from, at prices ranging from \$200 to \$2,000. Pressure washers are rated according to the water pressure they produce. Most standard garden hoses deliver between 40 and 60 pounds per square inch (PSI), while pressure washers deliver 1,400 to 4,000 PSI. A pressure washer takes water from the garden hose and pressurizes it through a small high-pressure nozzle, creating a jet of supercharged water that can be used alone or combined with a cleaning agent. Medium service washers produce 2,000 to 3,000 PSI and can be used to remove grease and dirt from concrete, sidewalks, covers and coatings. Heavy-duty pressure washers produce 3,000 PSI or more, and can be used to clean large areas quickly, remove stubborn stains or rust patches, or remove paint. There are also a variety of commercial pressure washers in market, but if you have such an extensive job, it would probably be better to call in a professional pressure washing service. Another key factor in choosing a pressure washer is the amount of water it puts in, which is known as flow rate and is expressed as gallons per minute (GPM). The higher the flow rate, the faster a certain area will clean a pressure washer. Most residential pressure washers have a flow rate of 2 to 4 GPM. Interestingly, using a pressure washer can actually save substantially on water use. A garden hose operating at 60 PSI uses around 900 gallons per hour, while a pressure washer operating at 1,400 PSI only uses about 100 gallons per hour. We chose an average power service pressure washer with a power of 2,000 PSI, because we thought it would be the most versatile for home and garden use, and we have been very happy with our choice. We have used the pressure washer to clean our deck, including railings and stairs; to remove stubborn stains from the entrance; to clean brick cladding and walls; to clean and wash our gutters; as well as to clean our cars, bicycles, lawnmower, snow blower and lawn furniture. Pressure washers come in two types: gas and electricity. Gas pressure washers are known for their high pressure and unlimited mobility, they are also louder and require more maintenance. They can overheat if left idling for too long, and you have to winter them every year as they cannot be stored indoors. Electric pressure washers do not require special storage for winter, and less maintenance is required. They are more compact and quiet than their gas-powered counterparts. The downside is that you're limited in how far you can take them, but most units give you about 60 feet of range when you cable and hose lengths. The water pressure is slightly lower than that of gas models, but it must be strong enough to cope with most household cleaning tasks. Power and efficiencyThere are two figures you want to pay attention to when comparing the speed and efficiency of electrical pressure washers: pounds per square inch (PSI) and gallons per minute (GPM). PSI reflects water pressure as it exits the nozzle. A pressure washer with a higher PSI will be able to cope with harder stains than a machine with a lower PSI. GPM tells you how much water flows through the pressure washer every minute. The higher the number, the faster it will clean the washer under pressure. Electric pressure washers are usually designed for light tasks such as cleaning patio furniture or washing the car. They can range from 1,300 to 2,000 PSI, providing 1.5 to 2 GPMs. This should be a lot of energy for the occasional job, but if you use your pressure washer frequently or are tying a hard stain, you may want to consider upgrading to a more powerful gas pressure washer. Some units come with variable pressure settings that allow you to select lower pressure when working on delicate surfaces, but you can achieve a similar effect by choosing a different spray nozzle. STAFFBestReviewsThe hydroelectric pressure washers can have adjustable or replaceable nozzles. Different settings allow you to change the spray angle to suit your task. The lower the angle, the more concentrated the water current and the more effective it will be in cleaning. Adjustable nozzles are easier to use. All you have to do is twist it until you get to the right fit. Replaceable nozzles should be taken and turned off, and there's always a chance they'll get lost if you're not tracking them, but they can give you more options than a standard adjustable nozzle. There is no significant difference in performance between the two types of nozzles. HowConsider the length of the hose, and make sure it is long enough for the projects you need to. You also have to think about the material and the quality of the hose. It should be sturdy and durable, but you also want something that is flexible and doesn't retain too much coil memory. Too much coil memory can make it difficult to extend the hose to its entire length, and can get hooked on things more easily. A good pressure washer hose will also be easy to roll up and unroll. Most units have a space to the cable when the machine is not in use, and some even have a handle that allows you to quickly roll up on the cable so you don't have to wrap it manually. It is filled with soap before starting, and the pressure washer automatically mixes it with water when it comes out of the nozzle. Other models only have a siphon tube that sticks into a container of soap. Soap is sucked in and mixed with water before exiting the nozzle. Each system has advantages and disadvantages. A built-in soap dispenser is easier if you're going to move a lot, while you may need to keep moving the soap container if you're using a siphon hose. On the other hand, the built-in soap dispensers should be cleaned after each use – otherwise damage to the pressure washer pump may occur when drying. But if you're using a siphon tube, all you have to do is take it out and rinse it when you're done. Mobility Most pressure washers come with wheels so you can ride them, but the type of tire can affect your mobility. Tires can be pneumatic (such as your standard tyre for cars or bicycles), molded rubber, or plastic. Plastic wheels can chip, and tend to stick more easily. Tires are often the toughest option, although they may need to be re-inflated occasionally. You also have to take into account the size and weight of the unit and the type of terrain you are going to cover. You don't want to have to transport a bulky, heavy unit through the hills or over rocky terrain. Other cleaners (such as bleach) may damage the pressure washer pump and shorten machine life. There are pressure washers designed specifically for hot water, but the standard pressure washer is intended for use with cold water. The use of hot water in one of these machines could damage the pump. Q. How do I clean a clogged nozzle? A. Always turn off the machine and disconnect the spray gun before examining the nozzle. If clogged, you can use a small, thin wire to avoid any obstruction. Then, pass the water through it again to remove the remains. Connect it to the pressure washer and try again. Once again.

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
